Application open for LEND Trainee: Self-Advocacy and Leadership at CIDD

Our 2012-2013 Self-advocate, Chris Cordeiro explains that his favorite part of the experience has been learning and being part of the class. He emphasizes that through this experience he is gaining answers to questions he's had from previous experiences.

The LEND traineeship is a one year commitment that emphasizes leadership and self-advocacy skills. The trainee will be supported by an individual educational coach and faculty mentor across team projects and coursework.

Changes in Compensatory Education in NC Community College System

Nancye Gaj, Team Leader and Director of Professional Development and Instructional Support in College and Career Readiness presented on changes in the compensatory education program.

In addition to compensatory education not receiving specialized funding since 2010, the system as a whole has not kept up with the field in terms of services for this population. Revisions include serving students under The Basic Skills division, increasing access,

and enhancing training opportunities.

Discussion included topics such as model programs in PSE for individuals with I/DD, curriculum standards, professional development, and accountability.

Duke University's Divinity School is starting a **Friendship House** for individuals with intellectual disabilities to secure safe, affordable, and community-oriented housing in partnership with the divinity school. Applications are being accepted this summer.





Scholars with Diverse Abilities Program at Appalachian State University has their first student graduating in May and will be joining the School of Education graduation ceremony. This year they have 3 students and next year they are planning on taking up to 8 students. Additionally, they have been approved as a Certified Transition Program (CTR) and that students with I/DD can apply for financial aid. App State recently received a grant for the College Star Program to provide students with learning differences access to a host of services.

Davidson College recently opened a community center club house for young adults (18-25 years old) with high-functioning Autism (HFA). This initiative is part of the IGNITE program to support adults with HFA to be more involved in the community. IGNITE offers activities, skills training, and educational workshops to foster independence and experience a sense of community. For more information, click here.
